

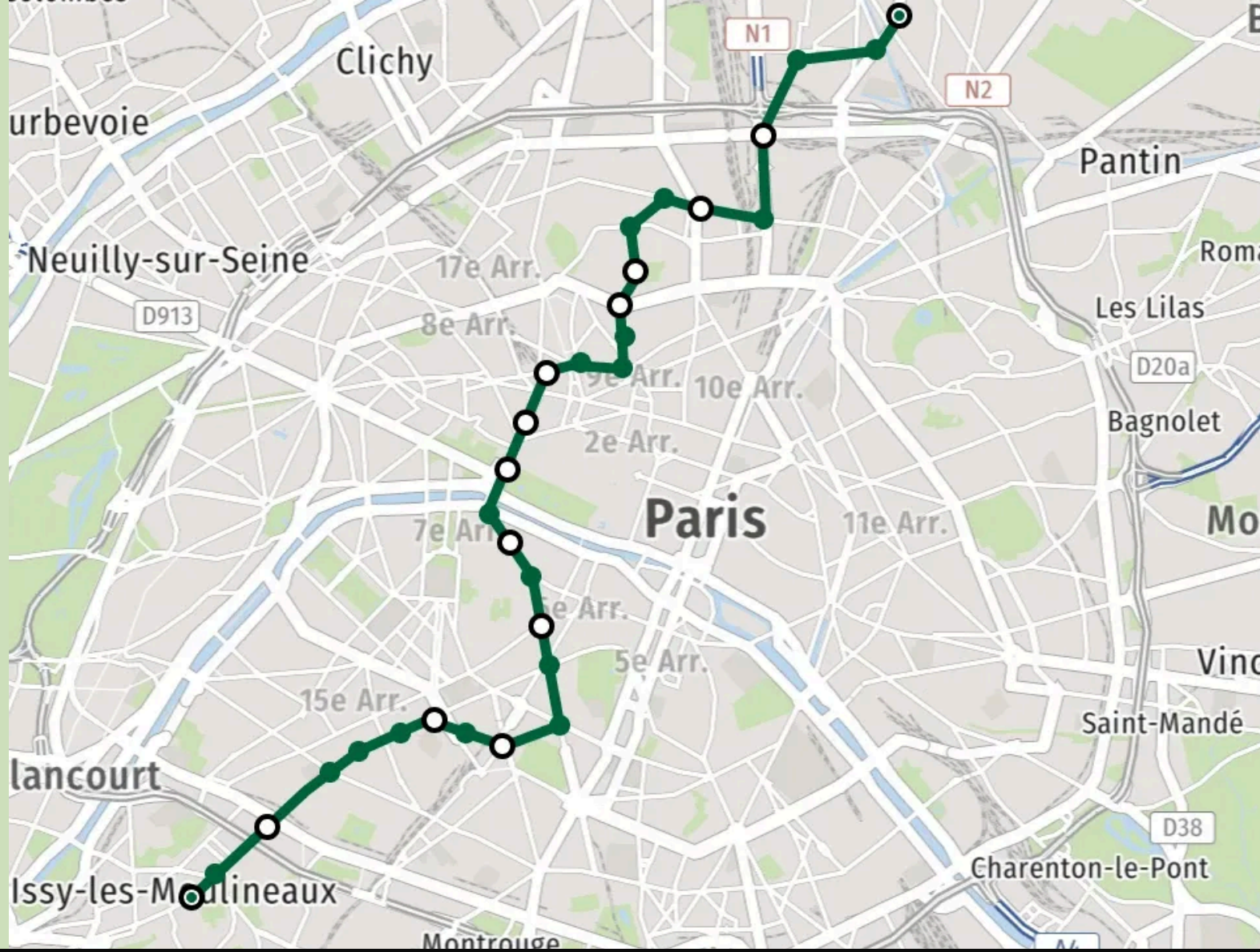
The **Campus Condorcet** is located in **Aubervilliers**, which is a commune located on the outskirts of Paris. The best way to get there is to use metro **line 12**, as there is a station right next to the conference venue.

-The **blue arrows** point to the two buildings we will be in during the conference:

Bâtiment de recherche Sud: 5 Cr des Humanités, 93300 Aubervilliers

Centre des colloques: Place du Front populaire, 93300 Aubervilliers

-The **green arrow** points to the metro station (**Front Populaire**).



We recommend staying close to metro **line 12** so that you can get to the venue easily. Otherwise, any metro line that intersects with line 12 and that runs in the north of Paris can be a good option as well (for example line 4 or line 13). For information, the farthest metro station (**Mairie d'Issy**) from the conference venue (**Front Populaire**) is 40 minutes away.

The north of Paris is one of the capital's most sought-after districts, thanks to its dynamic, lively character and mixed population, which is resisting (with difficulty) the accelerated gentrification of its neighbourhoods.

We particularly recommend finding accommodation at the following stations: **Jules Joffrin, Lamarck-Caulaincourt, Abbesses, Pigalle, Saint-Georges, Notre-Dame-de-Lorette, Trinité d'Estienne-d'Orves**. All the stations are very safe during the day and at night.

- The buzziest stations at night are undoubtedly **Abbesses** and **Pigalle**, because of their proximity to Sacré-Coeur, which is very popular with tourists all year round, and because of the high concentration of bars and cafés there. Pigalle is particularly popular with young people because of its nightlife.

- **Jules Joffrin** and **Lamarck-Caulaincourt** are more residential, but have a very friendly and lively neighbourhood life, with beautiful squares in Jules Joffrin and beautiful views of the Sacré-Coeur and the north of Paris in Lamarck-Caulaincourt. It's a little off the beaten tourist track.

- **Saint-Georges, Notre-Dame-de-Lorette** and **Trinité d'Estienne-d'Orves** are closer to the centre of Paris and are more akin to the upmarket districts of the capital, frequented by wealthy families. There are plenty of trendy shops and family life.

It's also possible to find accommodation near **Saint-Denis, Aubervilliers** or **Saint-Ouen**: more popular, these suburbs that now make up Le Grand Paris are very pleasant places.
